### **Refugee Solidarity Walk at Holy Names High School**

Students from Holy Names High School, Oakland and St. Theresa School organized a Refugee Solidarity Walk to simulate and learn about the plight of refugees. HNHS students turned away the St. Theresa students at the "border" (HNHS campus) and then funneled them into a queue to be processed by border agents in small groups. At the processing table, HNHS students spoke only in French and Spanish to replicate the experience of a refugee entering a land with little or no knowledge of the spoken language. Once processed, Catholic Relief Services took each group and shared food and water with them. This was a tremendous learning experience for everyone
